Keep the hope
It matters, and it works.



After the winter comes the spring: the daffodils are out (*pictured above*) by the Everton Lock-up at the top of Everton Brow. Plant the bulbs, keep the hope, stay patient, wait, and slowly they grow and come up in all their colourful glory.

After the hours of practice comes the performance: children from Faith Primary School (*pictured above*) performed magnificently with children from the Beacon School in the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Hall in the 8th "In Harmony" concert on Monday March 20th. 250 children filled the stage, and they played pieces by Bizet and Offenbach as well as selections from Pirates of the Caribbean, the Grand old Duke of York, Break time Boogie among others to draw heartfelt applause from parents, relations, friends and supporters. Practise, put in the hard work, keep the hope, and out comes the winning performance. Lose hope, don't practise, no performance, no applause.

After many years of campaigning for the regeneration of Great Homer Street, the Sainsbury's store is due to open in May, other stores and facilities will follow. Project Jennifer (*pictured below and see page 3 for the explanation of the name*) was begun in 1998. Then in 2004 St Modwen was named as the developer of the scheme. Outline planning permission for the scheme was granted in 2009 and the supermarket



Sainsbury's came on board that same year. In 2010 Tesco dropped their appeal against the scheme and the compulsory purchase orders were able to go ahead. Keep the hope... for spring, for new skills learned as with the children of Faith and the Beacon, and for campaigns like the regeneration of Great

Homer Street, Project Jennifer, to improve our area and community and shops.

And the Easter message? A group in danger of losing hope as their Messiah is unjustly crucified. Then came Easter Day and Mary sees the risen Jesus, even doubting Thomas is convinced, and the Christian church is launched. Have a great Easter!

Housing update and Parking chaos?



The block of apartments (*pictured left*) on the corner of Shaw Street and College Street North still stands unfinished and ignored. It caused disruption to local residents for many months, and all seemingly so far for no purpose. Meanwhile other blocks of apartments are going up on Fox Street and Prince Edwin Street, right by valued local businesses and alongside Millstead and Faith Primary Schools. Local residents raised objections and

questions about the type of housing, the parking issue, but the blocks are still going up.

Parking is becoming an increasing concern across our community (*see William Henry Street pictured below*). West Everton Community Council (WECC) held a meeting on March 29th about car parking and the threat to stop running the 101 bus. A good



number of local residents attended and raised detailed concerns on both issues: access for emergency vehicles, the 101 bus having to re-route as it can't get through, the blocking of pavements and people's gates, wheelchairs and buggies not able to use pavements, the need for the 101 to access work, hospital, GP appointments, shops, family and needed for getting up and down steep hills.
